MANAGER'S REPORT: Store Trash Receptacles


n Monday December 14, 1998, your Park Paseo Board of Directors met at the clubhouse for its regularly scheduled meeting. President Jeff McCoy called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Also present were directors Mike Krahelski, Ann Kahn, Ernie Jones, and Ric Cox, manager Perry Carter, and two homeowners.

The minutes of the November 1998 BOD meeting and the November Architectural committee meeting were approved as corrected. The financial records from November 1998 were also approved.

The Board directed management to send thirty day letters to two homeowners three months in arrears and ten-day letters to two homeowners four months in arrears. Two accounts were referred to our attorney for collection. The Board voted to invest a \$40,000.00 CD in a federally in-

sured financial institution at the best available rate. Hanson Associates communicated that the completion date for the Alba totlot play equipment would be delayed until mid-February due to shipping delays. The Board approved a bid from Earthcare Landscape in the amount of \$9,030.00 to trim 205 trees and to remove certain other damaged trees. Work is scheduled to begin immediately.

The Board heard from a homeowner requesting a rescission of fines assessed for not submitting a paint application and for not painting his house an approved color. (Please see page 3.)



Trash receptacles must be stored out of sight.


Trash cans, lawnmowers, debris, and storage may not be visible from the street. They must be stored behind the gate or in the garage. I realize it is probably more convenient to leave these receptacles closer to the street-but it is extremely unsightly and can be a hazard.

On my next drive through the community I will be checking for

these items. Please remember to store all trash, receptacles, debris, and lawnmowers out of sight.

The Association's schedule of fees and fines provides for a first offense warning letter, a \$25.00 fine for the second offense, and a \$50.00 fine for the third offense. Because of the volume and frequency of this type of violation, the situation will be monitored more closely than in the past.

Trash to be picked up weekly is not to be put out for pickup until Sunday evening. Trash receptacles are to be removed from view by Monday evening. If this procedure is not followed it presents an unsightly appearance and may attract animals.

The Board directed the homeowner to submit the proper application with acceptable colors to the Architectural Committee for approval before it would consider rescinding any fines. Another homeowner attended to discuss improving landscape conditions between her home and the pool. Some of the trees and shrubs had been damaged by wind and removed and had not been replaced. In addition, the common wall to a greenbelt had been trimmed on the greenbelt side which resulted, according to the homeowner, in a loss of privacy. The Board voted to replace the tree and add some shrubs in the area to help create a visual and auditory barrier.

Management also reported on lost or damaged trees and property caused by the last severe windstorm.

The Board approved a bid by Robco Insurance to renew its insurance policy for liability, fire, property, and earthquake coverage.

Management was instructed to send a sympathy card to the Witmer family expressing the Board's sympathy upon learning of the death of Jim Witmer who was one of the original Park Paseo Board members and presidents. Mr. Witmer was also a valuable member of the Park Paseo Northstar swim team during the eighties and early nineties.

There being no further business to come before the board, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for January 11, 1999 at 7:00 p.m. Homeowners are encouraged to attend.

TIPS ON SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME DURING THE HOLIDAYS

The holiday season is here, bringing joy, happiness and new opportunities for everyone-especially burglars. The rise in burglaries is attributed to the mass purchase of merchandise and the tendency for many of us to let our guard down during the holiday season. We suggest that you follow these security measures to reduce your risk of being a burglar's next holiday victim:

Around the House

- Always close your drapes when you're not home, so you're not exposing your holiday gifts.
- Put lights on timers to make it look as if you're home even while you're at parties or shopping.
- Always remember to lock your doors and windows when leaving, even if it's only for a brief time.

Holiday Shopping

- Try to park near a lighted and busy entrance to the shopping mall or store.
- Carry only \$100 or less when shopping. Many malls have indoor ATM's where you can get money.
- Carry only one credit card and use it for all purchases.
- When resting, don't leave your packages on the ground.
- Have your car keys in hand so you don't have to linger before entering your car. Keys can also serve as a weapon against an attacker.
- Avoid setting down your purchases when getting into your car.
- Put purchases in the trunk, not the back seat of your car, so potential thieves can't see them.

Driving Home

- If you think you are being followed, drive to a public place or police station. If it is unsafe to get out of your car, honk your horn and flash your lights.
- If your car breaks down, open the hood and attach a white cloth to your car antenna. If someone stops to help, stay in your locked car (windows up) and ask him or her to call the police or a garage.

By following these simple security measures, you can help ensure a happy and safe holiday season.
