n Monday November 13, 2000, your Park Paseo Board of Directors met at the clubhouse for its regularly scheduled meeting. President Ric Cox called the meeting to order at 7:05 P.M. Also present were directors Mike Krahelski, Jeff McCoy, Ann Kahn, & Ernie Jones, manager Perry Carter, and one homeowner.

The minutes of the October, 2000 BOD meeting were approved as corrected. The financial records from the October 2000 meeting were approved. The minutes from the October Architectural Committee meeting were approved as corrected. The Action items/responses from the October BOD meeting were reviewed.

The Board directed management to send thirty-day letters to four homeowners three months in arrears in their dues, and tenday letters to five homeowners

four months in arrears. The Board directed management to obtain three CPA bids to do the Association's year 2000 audit.


The December landscape beautification award was given to the David Chapple residence at 5 Kara East.

EarthCare Landscaping's survey and testing of our 240 irrigation valves found 71 to be non-working or barely working original equipment and in need of replacement. The BOD approved replacing the valves over the next three months at a cost of \$13,203.00.

A homeowner scheduled to appear to show cause why a fine should not be assessed against him for not correcting his architectural violation failed to appear. The BOD decided that the fine schedule was appropriate and should continue until the violation is corrected.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 8:45 P.M. The next PPHOA BOD meeting will be December 11, 2000.

Manager's Report: Stay Safe This Holiday Season

n behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone in Park Paseo a safe and happy holiday season. With that in mind, I would like to re-run a previous column that many residents found helpful.

TIPS ON SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME DURING THE HOLIDAYS

The holiday season is approaching, bringing joy, happiness, and new opportunities for everyone-especially burglars. The rise in burglaries is attributed to the mass purchase of merchandise and the tendency for many of us to let our guard down during the holiday season. We suggest that you follow these security measures to reduce your risk of being a burglar's next holiday victim.

Around the House

- Always close your drapes when you're not home so you're not exposing your holiday gifts.
- Put lights on timers to make it look as if you're home even while you're at parties or shopping.
- Always remember to lock your doors and windows when leaving, even if it's only for a brief time.

Holiday Shopping


- Try to park near a lighted and busy entrance to the shopping mall or store.
- Carry only \$100 or less in cash when shopping. Many malls have indoor ATM's where you can get money.
- Carry only one credit card and use it for all purchases.
- When resting, don't leave your packages on the ground.
- Have your car keys in hand so you don't have to linger before entering your car. Keys can also serve as a weapon against an attacker.
- Avoid setting down your purchases when getting into your car.
- Put purchases in the trunk, not on the back seat of your car, so potential thieves can't see them.

Driving Home

- If you think you are being followed, drive to a public place or police station. If it is unsafe to get out of your car, honk your horn and flash your lights.
- If your car breaks down, open the hood and attach a white cloth to your car antenna. If someone stops to help, stay in your locked car (windows up) and ask him or her to call the police or a garage.

By following these simple security measures, you can help ensure a happy and safe holiday season.
